Her education and personal experience led her to expand into sexual health, with a focus on the sexual development and well-being of young children. As an early childhood sexual health consultant, she helps educators and families gain confidence in having conversations about consent, bodies, and gender issues. She has led workshops at conferences around the country and has been featured as a resource for news articles on these topics.

Teaching Consent to Young Children

In an age of frequent assault allegations and abuse statistics, how do we raise children to understand, set, and respect personal boundaries? Learn specific strategies for teaching consent foundations in early childhood classrooms.



Every parent I know wants their child to grow up to be confident, be resilient, feel good about who they are, and show compassion toward others. As parents, we want to communicate: "You matter. Your body matters. Your consent and boundaries matter." (Lisa McCrohan)

The Brain For the Rest of Us

Amygdala, hippocampus, and neurotransmitters. Oh my! We do not have to be researchers experienced in the anatomy to comprehend the brain.

Lydia Bowers Quantitative EEG, has been utilized and been seen as a quantum leap in the understanding of the brain for research purposes. But what about parents, youth workers and the rest of us that need to know how the functions of the brain translate into behavior, Attendees will review the results from case studies of individuals with diverse brain conditions such as under developed limbic systems, trauma, reactive attachment disorder, autism, ADHD, depression, addiction, learning disabilities, that include dyscalculia, dyslexia and others. This presentation will examine brain-based support interventions, and how regular people can understand behavior and create interventions.

**"Reject" Documentary and Discussion
How Rejection Can Lead to Violence, Self-Harm and Suicide**

REJECT takes a science-based and solution-oriented look at the roots of bullying behavior and violent behavior against the self or others. The film aims to raise public consciousness about the serious and potentially lethal consequences of interpersonal rejection in its many forms—peer bullying, parental neglect (or abuse), race discrimination, and other forms of social rejection across all age groups. It speaks to parents, teachers, administrators, organizations that train teachers, coaches, mental health professionals, clergy, counselors, juvenile judges, office managers—that is, anyone entrusted with influence over others and in a position to foster acceptance, inclusion and social connection.
